Dr. Barber, who was the chair of the English department where I served as the secretary when I began working at DBU, had been diagnosed with a malignant brain tumor, and Sheila's concern for her friend was a tribute to the caring and affectionate person that she is. I watched carefully as Sheila ministered to Dr. Barber in amazing ways through her infectious laughter, her ability to weave interesting and humorous stories, and just being a friend by helping meet her needs.

Praise God for His power to heal and restore.

Before coming to DBU, Sheila taught in public schools for 18 years. During the early years while David and Mark were in school, she enjoyed the opportunity to volunteer in DBU's Lab School where they were enrolled as students. She has a wonderful way with children and provided a very happy and secure home for her precious boys as they grew up on the DBU campus. They are both remarkable young men who walk closely with the Lord.

Sheila, like her husband, is hard working and diligent in her pursuit to do all things well. With a genuine love and concern for others, she exhibits the gifts of mercy, hospitality, and teaching. Everywhere Sheila goes, she creates an inviting atmosphere of warmth and love and especially uses her gift of hospitality to minister to our DBU family. At countless receptions, luncheons, dinners, wedding showers, and baby showers, she has served as an exceptional hostess, making each person feel welcomed and at home. Dr. Gary Cook is the finest servant leader I have ever known. He is my mentor, advisor, brother in Christ, and dearest friend.
